## Directions

Answer all of the following questions. Each answer should be at least 100 words and a maximum of 200 words. Please provide a word count for each of your answers.

Many of these are open-ended questions that could be the subject of a book, but I ask you to synthesize, to lay out essential arguments and important details. Choose your words carefully.

Cite quotations, examples, paraphrases, and the source of key ideas (as you would in a paper). If you are citing books or articles from the course schedule, you may simply use a parenthetical reference with author's name and page number. If you want to cite sources outside of our class readings (which is not at all necessary) you should use a complete Chicago-style footnote citation.

The goal here is to pull together and reflect on the work that we have done this semester. I don't expect that you will do any research beyond the work that we have done this semester.

- 1. How does Eric Hobsbawm interpret the "Age of Empire" and its relationship to the First World War?
- 2. How does Charles Emmerson explain the world in 1913?
- 3. How does the world in 1900 look from the periphery? Offer a general response and then pick one example to support your answer.
- 4. How does Adam Hochschild's King Leopold's Ghost illuminate the world in 1900?
- 5. How does Robert Rydell and Rob Kroes' *Buffalo Bill in Bologna* illuminate the world in 1900?
- 6. Choose one important or characteristic technology or one important or characteristic material from this world. Explain your choice. What does it tell us about the world in 1900?
- 7. Choose one important or characteristic idea from this world. Explain your choice. What does it tell us about the world in 1900?
- 8. Why study the history of the world at one moment of time? What are the advantages and what are the limitations of this kind of historical inquiry?
- 9. How should we understand the relationship between the world in 1900 and our own world (let's say, the post-1989 world)?
